# Advancing Law & Governance Contributions to Climate Action under the Paris Agreement

### Climate Law & Governance Day 2018

During the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change 24th Conference of the Parties (COP24), co-hosted by University of Silesia & University of Cambridge

In collaboration with leading faculties of law of the University of Silesia, the 2018 Climate Law and Governance Day (CLGD) will take place on 07 December 2018, during the 24th Conference of the Parties (COP) of the UNFCCC in Katowice, Poland. CLGD 2018 follows key preparatory events this year, especially the CLGD Roundtable on 05 May in Bonn, Germany, and constitutes an unprecedented opportunity to share ideas, debate trends and advances, and build legal momentum for climate action. The CLGD 2018 international legal symposium builds on the success of CLGD 2015 at La Sorbonne Law School during COP21 in Paris, CLGD 2016 at the Université Privée de Marrakech and Hassane I University during COP22 in Marrakech and CLGD 2017 with the University of the South Pacific and the University of Bonn during COP23 in Bonn.

Legal and institutional transformation is needed to support global and local efforts to limit the temperature increase to 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels, to adapt to the adverse impacts of climate change and foster climate resilience and low greenhouse gas emissions development, and to make finance flows consistent with a pathway towards such development. Over 160 countries have stressed the importance of such reforms in their nationally determined contributions (NDCs) submitted to deliver on the Paris Agreement. More than 50 of these countries specifically emphasized the need for climate legal and institutional capacity-building to be able to achieve their objectives. Over 20,000 delegates, including many leading climate law and governance experts are expected to gather in Katowice for the UNFCCC COP 24, from 3-14 December 2018.

This special one-day symposium convenes a community of judges, law faculties and legal institutes, government authorities, law associations, and others responsible for inspiring, innovating and building law and governance capacity. The focus is on advances in climate law and governance to implement the global climate regime. The themes of CLGD 2018, as agreed in the legal experts roundtable at the UNFCCC Bonn Climate Conference in May 2018 and in discussion with the partner law faculties and others, include:

- Legal Incentives for Scaling Up Investment in Paris Agreement Implementation
  - How can new financial flows be encouraged; what are the obstacles and how can they be overcome? What are the roles of new technology and financial instruments, and how do we ensure that we meet adaptation investment priorities at all levels of governance?
- Advancing a Rule of Law, Climate Justice & Sustainable Development Agenda

  - What is the status of "environmental integrity" in Article 6.2, and the potential of Article 6.4 on the Sustainable Development Mechanism? What is the status of work around Article 13? What is the status of Article 15 and what can be learned from other MEAs regarding non-compliance? How can other relevant modalities, procedures and guidelines, including through the participation of non-state actors, deliver the Paris Agreement objectives most effectively?
